# Pacific Horticulture Presents the Imperial Cities of Majestic Morocco

October 18 - 30, 2025



Departures from the USA Oct 17th, 2025: Please advise Sterling if a pre night is desired.

OCT 18 — SAT: ARRIVE CASABLANCA/ RABAT - Independent arrivals at Casablanca or Rabat airports and transfers to the hotel\* in the stately capital of Rabat, a World Heritage city. The remainder of the day is free to relax from the journey. An early evening cocktail reception at the hotel, followed by a Continental dinner. \*(Two group transfers will be provided on October 18 only, one for Casablanca airport and one for Rabat airport, in conjunction with the largest number of arrival flights in a similar time frame. Individual transfers may be arranged for other participants, at cost.)



*Villa Mandarine*, the city's foremost boutique hotel, is in the diplomatic enclave, full of art and museum-quality crafts, a heated pool, and one of the city's most renowned cuisines. 3 nights here. **(D)** 

### OCT 19 - SUN: BOUKNADEL/ RABAT -

In the morning we depart on an excursion a half-hour north of the city to the Jardins Exotiques of Bouknadel. These vast gardens, with 7 world themes, were created in the 1950s by a French resident and have been



recently restored to their original beauty and as an educational center under the guidance of the King's youngest sister. A seafood lunch by the crashing waves of the Atlantic is followed by a leisurely walk through the picturesque Oudaya Kasbah.



A former lair of Barbary Coast corsairs, with an Andalusian Garden and the Oudaya Gate, a prime example of the purely Moroccan architectural style developed under the 12th-century Almohad Dynasty. There we visit the National Museum of Jewelry and Adornment. A welcome dinner of Moroccan delights

awaits at the Dinarjat in the medina. (B, L, D)

OCT 20 — MON: RABAT - The city tour continues with a walk through the Chellah fortress, its remains are of the Roman colony of Sala and the necropolis of the 14th-century Marinid Dynasty amid lush vegetation. Next, the kingdom's prime National Archaeological Museum and the Museum of Contemporary Moroccan Art, in a magnificent structure of neo-Moorish architecture. Lunch awaits at the Center for Cross Cultural Learning in the Rabat medina, with a presentation on U.S.– Moroccan relations over the centuries.\* A stop to see the ornate mausoleum of modern Morocco's "father" King Mohamed V, set on the grounds of what had been meant to be the world's largest



mosque with the tallest minaret in the Almohad Dynasty period. The remainder of the day is free to relax amid the hotel's lounges and gardens. Tonight's dinner is French at the Restaurant Cosmopolitan. (B, L, D)

OCT 21 — TUE: RABAT TO FES - The Rabat visit concludes this morning at the city's Botanical Gardens, established in 1917 and set on 42 acres, with hundreds of plant varieties. We return to the hotel in time to check out and enjoy a light lunch, following which there is a 2½-hr drive to spiritual capital Fes, whose medina is considered by scholars to be the last true example of a typical medieval Arab city. The remainder of the afternoon is at leisure, albeit those interested may proceed in the late afternoon to one of the city's ateliers for ceramics and zellige (mosaic tile), a Fesi specialty since the 14th century. Dinner at the hotel.



Le Grand Alcazar, a majestic former mansion within the old city that has been converted to a boutique hotel with traditional Moroccan décor. 3 nights here. (B, L, D)

OCT 22 — WED: FES - The day belongs to Fes. Founded by Idriss II, a direct descendant of the Prophet, and former capital of the 14th-century Amazigh Marinid Dynasty. Begin with a walking tour of 9th-century "Old" Fes, with its jewels of art spanning a millennium — pilgrimage shrines, intricately embellished



theological schools, caravanserais, and the world's oldest still functional university, the Qarawyine. Along with the famed leather tanneries and craft quarters where the arts are passed in ageless ways from master to disciple. Lunch during the walk at the Ruined Garden. In the afternoon we tour 8-centuries-old "New" Fes, with its Bou Inaniya theological school, to many the top masterpiece of Marinid architecture, and the famed "Blue" Gate. Dinner of Fesi delicacies at the Maison Bleue. **(B, L, D)** 

# OCT 23 - THU: VOLUBILIS/ MEKNES/ MEDITERRANEAN CEDARS - An



excursion takes us first west to the ruins of Rome's regional commercial hub Volubilis, renowned for its numerous mosaics still in situ. Then south to Meknes, the 17th-Century capital of the current dynasty's founder Sultan Moulay Ismaïl, where we see the World Heritage immense granary he built to sustain the city's population

and his thousands of horses for up to a year-long siege. The Meknes region is the

Kingdom's main wine center, and we enjoy a tasting of prime crûs and lunch at one of the foremost prime vineyards. A short drive from there brings us into the Middle Atlas Mountains, where we admire the last forest of giant Mediterranean cedars and may spot a band of the indigenous Barbary macaques. Return to Fes via mountain station Ifrane, site of Africa's most prestigious



university, the Al Akhawayne, with late afternoon arrival. Dinner today is on your own. **(B, L)** 

**OCT 24 — FRI: MARRAKECH** - An early morning departure on the limited-access autoroute east to Casablanca and then south to legendary Marrakech, with a break in route at a service station eatery where you can purchase a light lunch. A mid-afternoon arrival at the hotel. A welcome cocktail followed by dinner at the hotel.



*Jnane Tamsna*, a boutique hotel set on 9 acres of greenery amid the palm groves outside of the city. 6 nights here. **(B, D)** 

## OCT 25 - SAT: MAJORELLE GARDEN/ RED

MEDINA - The day begins with a stroll in the exotic garden that French Orientalist Jacques Majorelle created in the 1920s, restored by Yves Saint-Laurent, who lived in Majorelle's former home. There we visit the exquisite Museum of Berber Arts as well as the new YSL Museum



next to the garden. Then into the old city and its Monde des Arts de la Parure, a unique venue showcasing some 3,000 articles of ornament, clothing and other ethnographic arts from nearly every corner of the world, based on the lifelong collection of an Italian couple who reside in the city. A Lebanese lunch awaits on the museum's shaded rooftop terrace. From there we head to the Bahia ("Resplendent") Palace of a late 19th-Century vizier, a showcase of Moorish-Andalusian art once spread on 20 acres and still



used by the Royal family for special occasions. Also, a stop by the 12th-Century Koutoubia Mosque, the symbol of the city and a "reference" of world Islamic architecture, built under the Amazigh Almodad Dynasty (who also built Seville's Giralda minaret as a "sister" to the Koutoubia). Afternoon return to the hotel, with a wine tasting and dinner there this

evening. (B, L, D)

#### OCT 26 – SUN: THE SAADIANS/ AFRICAN

ART - In the morning, we head to the Al Badi Palace of the Saadians, the first Arab Dynasty to rule over the land that is now Morocco. With Marrakech their capital, the palace, according to travelers of that period, was the most lavish in the world, surpassing even those of India's Moghul emperors. Yet, the founder of the succeeding dynasty laid it to waste, taking



anything of value to use in the building of his own palace in Meknes. While its ruins still give a feel for its former grandeur, within it we see the Koutoubia minbar, a 12-foothigh preacher's pulpit of inlaid wood, fashioned in Cordoba in 1139 CE and recently restored by the Metropolitan Museum of Art.

We move on to the Saadian Dynasty's mausoleum, the last window left into the lavishness of their late 17th-Century art. Lunch is at the exquisite Oberoi hotel, amid a manicured garden designed by Madison Cox.

Post-lunch a visit of MACAAL, the museum of sub-Saharan African art, with the stroll through the unique sculpture garden next to it. Return to the Jnane Tamsna in the afternoon, in time for a cooking class, followed by dinner. (B, L, D)

OCT 27 — MON: INTO THE SOUQ - In the morning penetrate the vast bazaars,



Morocco's largest, to see a myriad of crafts still fashioned by hand. We wind our way to Le Jardin Secret, a vast green space hidden amid the maze of the souqs, part of a royal residence initially established in the 16th century, rebuilt twice, eventually abandoned and finally restored and opened to the public for the first time in its history in 2016. Also a visit of the Ben

Youssef Medersa, a theological school initially built in the 14th Century. An astounding buffet lunch awaits us at the Hotel la Mamounia, the country's most famed, where Churchill spent much of his retirement and whose guests have included the "who's who" of the world. We also have time to walk through its garden. The return to the edge of the medina for a visit of the grandiose Dar al Basha palace of T'hami el Glaoui, the city's

overlord during French days, to see the museum within of interreligious currents as expressed in crafts and beliefs. In the evening the hotel's owner Meryanne Loum-Martin shall provide a talk on Moroccan lifestyles and her book "Inside Marrakech," followed by dinner. (B, L, D)

**OCT 28 — TUE: THE ANIMA -** A mid-morning excursion to the Anima, on everyone's



list of "must-see" world gardens. A whimsical, magical world spread on over 7 acres 35 min South of the city, the creation of Austrian artist André Heller, with lush vegetation from around the world interspersed with large works of modern art by renowned world artists, including such as Picasso and Alexander Calder. Lunch is at a nearby garden

hotel and the remainder of the day is free for personal pursuits. Dinner tonight is on your own, to try Marrakech's variety of world-class eateries. (B, L)

OCT 29 — WED: INTO THE ATLAS - This morning we drive to the Ourika Valley the foothills of the High Atlas Mountains with ethnobotanist Gary Martin, to visit Dar Taliba, a boarding school for girls from remote mountain communities where they might not have had a chance for education otherwise. The school's ethnobotanical program and garden is one of Gary's Global Diversity Foundation (GDF) projects.



The GDF supports biodiversity conservation in the High Atlas, while maintaining cultural landscapes and conserving biocultural heritage. From there we cross the mountains to the pristine N'Fis Valley until the Olinto Atlas Mountain Retreat for a gourmet lunch based on local seasonal produce. On our way back to the city we stop at the garden home of celebrated Moroccan artist Abderrahim Yamou, whose paintings, often inspired by nature, offer a 3-dimensional effect. Late-afternoon return to the hotel.



A special evening is planned at Jnane Tamsna with Moroccan music and drinks on the roof terrace and a farewell candlelight dinner. (B, L, D)

OCT 30 — THU: DEPARTURE - Transfers to Marrakech airport in conjunction with outbound flights. (B)
